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Leisure envisions big changes by 2032 New recreation complex, soccer fields, ball diamonds recommended in Master Plan

Leisure Master Plan. Over the past 10 months, Stouffville's Leisure and Community Services Department had been undertaking the creation of a new Master Plan. The Plan outlines current and future leisure needs and prioritizes facility and program investment over the next ten-year period, up to and including

The Plan was approved by Council at the September 21 meeting.

The Master Plan is intended to provide a strategy for ensuring equitable access to programs, events and facilities that enhance and promote healthy and active living. It assists in guiding the location and creation of new facilities; outlines strategies for the optimal use of existing facilities and parks; provide recommendations for increased participation in a variety of programs and, where possible, the enhancement and effective delivery of services.

The Plan made a total of 144 recommendations, each targeted to a specific area for action.

Research revealed that many recreational activities continue to experience growth and will require additional or expanded facilities to accommodate anticipated future requirements. Based on public input and consultation, the greatest needs appear to be related to additional indoor aquatic facilities, an indoor walking track, more heritage facilities and cultural celebrations, the improvement of parks, inclusive and safe playgrounds, improved trail signage and expansion of event offerings.

Stouffville is projected to reach a population of over 72,000 by 2032 according to the Plan. This, if the current ratio of parkland to residents of 1.84 ha/ 1,000 people is maintained, means the

Town will need 57 ha of additional parks

As a result, 22 recommendations within the Plan focused on parkland, open spaces and land acquisition policies, many concentrating on development proposals and their effect on the Town's Official Plan. An additional 9 recommendations focused on park design and development, including trees and inclusive design

In addition to adding parkland assets, the Plan also suggested numerous additions to the Town's indoor sports facilities. These included an "indoor aquatics centre as part of a new multiuse community recreation complex. The choice of location and site, including design configuration, should anticipate the need to potentially expand the facility to meet growth-related demand to 2051."

As part of this new "multi-use community recreation centre," the Plan recommends "commission(ing) two new indoor ice surfaces" by 2030.

The Plan suggests, in the meantime, that the Town "ensure that operational practices and resources are sufficient to meet the growing demand for use of these existing (ice and aquatic) facilities."

Seven recommendations focused on heritage, events and the Museum, while 11 more concentrated on the 'Nineteen on the

Park' theatre, and other community halls and facilities.

The Plan also contained 21 recommendations focusing on outdoor sports fields and facilities. Included are recommendations regarding baseball and softball diamonds to "increase the net supply...by as many as six (6) fields. This can be achieved in large part through the development of a tournament capacity four (4) senior diamonds complex to be located in or near Stouffville."

For soccer, the Plan suggests the town "...seek to develop as many as ten (10) additional soccer/multi-use fields..." and "... invest in artificial turf at the main field at the Stouffville Arena Park." In total, 15 recommendations focused on soccer.

Playgrounds, trails, tennis, pickleball, skate parks and outdoor rinks constituted the majority of the remaining recommendations.

Lights, Camera, Action

How a new state-of-the-art interventional radiology suite is giving doctors at Markham Stouffville Hospital clearer images and getting patients home faster. BY GLYNIS RATCLIFFE

On January 4, 83-year-old William Baker, feeling enormous pressure in his abdomen, ran to the bathroom, where a startling amount of blood poured out of his body. His wife drove him directly to the emergency department at Oak Valley Health's Markham Stouffville Hospital (MSH).

Baker underwent numerous tests until a colonoscopy showed the bleeding had stopped. Seemingly stable, he was discharged home, but a few hours later, it started again, forcing Baker to return to the hospital. Moments after being brought into the acute care zone of MSH's emergency department, he bled out and lost consciousness.

It turned out to be colonic diverticular bleeding, a type of hemorrhage where the artery that supplies blood to the ascending colon ruptures. While the bleeding often stops on its own, if the vessel does not clot by itself, it becomes an emergency requiring immedi-

ate medical attention, often handled by interventional radiologists.

PRECISION IMAGING

Interventional radiology (IR) uses real-time imaging like ultrasound, CT, MRI or X-ray fluorography to help guide small instruments, such as wires and catheters, through the body to diagnose and treat medical issues. "We need to send a tiny camera in to look for the source of the leak, and then we can go back in and patch it up," Dr. Ramez Hanna, one of the interventional radiologists at MSH.

IR is far less invasive than regular surgery, employing mild sedation and local anaesthetic, rather than general anaesthetic. The IR team creates a small incision, which is less traumatic for the patient and results in shorter hospital stays and faster recovery times.

With Baker, the interventional radiologist performed an embolization,

which involved putting a tiny wire coil into the ruptured blood vessel to stop the bleed. Michael Wilson, a medical radiation technologist and interventional radiology technical specialist at the hospital, and his team used ultrasound as a visual guide to insert a catheter into the femoral artery, located near the hip.

From there, they used fluoroscopy – a kind of live X-ray – and contrast injections to locate the ruptured vessel. It was an intricate process that required directing progressively smaller wires into the nearby vessels to find the damaged one, which took more than two hours but was ultimately successful.

REDESIGNING IR

While Baker's treatment utilized many innovative IR-related technologies, if his issues had arisen just three months later he would have been sent to the hospital's new 2,465-square-foot IR suite, which opened in April 2022. The suite boasts the new GE Allia IGS 7, a hulking but surprisingly nimble imaging system mounted on a laser-guided robotic arm.

The C-shaped piece of equipment is not tethered to the floor or ceiling; instead, its long arm reaches across the room and can be adjusted to any position around the surgical table, enhancing imaging precision by extending the angles at which images can be taken. "The difference between now and then is the image quality," notes Wilson.

Although the government funds many aspects of the healthcare experience, equipment replacements, technology advancements and other upgrades are largely thanks to community donations. The construction of the new IR suite, for instance, was made possible by the generosity of MSH's donors, especially Betty Miller and Family, and the important work of the MSH Foundation.

The number of patients treated in the IR has jumped to 2,000 yearly, from around 1,200. "This room has given us tremendous capabilities and it's getting used a lot," says Dr. Hanna. ■

FORMER NATIONAL TEAM SNIPER PROUD OF CANADA'S WORLD CUP ENTRY

Knee injuries stifled Tommy Kouzmanis' career but not his love for the game by Jim Mason

Tommy Kouzmanis sips his tea on the patio at the Main Street Bakehouse and ponders his picks before the start of this month's FIFA World Cup in Qatar.

This is no ordinary Stouffville prognosticator ahead of one of the biggest sporting events on the planet.

Kouzmanis, a Canada scarf under his coat, played soccer for his country on multiple occasions, including five outstanding games with the senior national team.

All while battling injuries to both knees that derailed a super-promising career.

He didn't just compete. At the age of 22, Kouzmanis became the first Canadian national team member to score two goals in their debut. He added two more goals in games with the senior team.

Kouzmanis grew up in a soccer family in Scarborough, starring on youth teams and playing for his country.

If this was hockey, he would have been a household name ahead of the NHL draft. As it was, he would be courted by big-name teams.

He represented Canada in international soccer at every level of play (senior men's, U23, U20, U17) and played professionally with the Montreal Impact, Toronto Lynx, and Wichita Wings.

He had stints overseas playing/training with European clubs Glasgow Rangers, Aston Villa, AEK Athens, OFI Crete and PAE Kalamata.

"But when it was time to really make a big splash and really make the big money...," Kouzmanis said of the knee issues. "We just couldn't get over it."

His four ACL reconstructions, include three on his right knee.

If this was hockey, he was Bobby Orr.

"You hear of one, two and maybe three," he said. "But four?"

Now 49, he's a trainer and quality control manager with Canada Protection Plan. Tommy and wife Marina moved to Stouffville in 2007. They have two soccer-playing kids, Ava, 10, and Christian, 8.

Kouzmanis has coached in Markham and taught at an academy but he's happy to simply watch his own children play these days. He was invited with other alumni to attend those games Canada won on home soil to qualify for the 2022 World Cup.

"It was so great to see," he said. "Because you knew you were a part of that over the years, whether it was at the youth levels or on the men's team. You felt it. You knew what it was like. You were there."

"To see these boys doing what they're doing is great. We hope it will continue and I think it will because this team is good. But looking down the road ... the chances of Canada making future world cups looks very positive."

Kouzmanis says he's hopeful but being realistic in predicting the Canadian will not advance beyond the first round in Qatar.

"I get it, this Canadian team is young and they're fast; they've found something special," he said. "They're playing a world soccer power in Belgium ... Next, Croatia is an older team and their style of play (won't allow) Canada to do that well. Their best chance of getting a result will be against Morocco."

"This team just getting to the World Cup is our accomplishment. It's been awhile."

And the success of the Canadian women's and men's teams is having an effect on the grassroots.

"It's been happening for a number of years," he said. "The participation numbers have always been there. This is just the catalyst to it."

CBS Sports: "Final Argentina 2, Germany 1 Messi gets his revenge for 2014 and writes himselfinto Argentina's history books alongside Diego Maradona."

Crowd Wisdom: "Brazil has the highest 2022 FIFA World Cup Winning odds and France is a close second. Brazil, France, Argentina, England, and Spain are separated by a very thin margin making this one of the most open World cup tournaments in recent times. Given their recent performance, the Netherlands cannot be overlooked."

Liberum Capital Ltd: "After toppling Spain in the semi-finals, Lionel Messi's Argentina will beat old rivals England in the Dec. 18 final in Qatar to lift their first World Cup in 36 years,"

I found The Coolest Little Ice Cream Shop on Facebook last December and followed their many posts about the Holiday Market. I was heavily disappointed that the annual Holiday Edition of OTR (2021) had failed to capture such a great resource. I vowed not to let it happen again.

I recently visited George. He's a friendly and enthusiastic man. He has owned the store for 15 years. It is packed from one end

to the other with locally made treasures. Yes, it is a popular ice cream shop and variety store, but George explained that it needed to evolve. "The clientele across the street at Fishbone by the Lake desire quality shopping experiences, so we have provided this experience," he said.

George gave us a tour of the shop. He is proud of every vendor in the store. "This is Made in a Barn - she makes fantastic signs from barnwood in Stouffville. This is Beach Restoration & Company - Nadia has the beach and cottage-themed items such as pillows and other home decor," said George. He is only getting started...

"This is fun - Kiss My Glass collects beach finds out East and turns them into jewelry. Here, Karen at Dog Gone Gear hand makes awesome dog collars. Over here, Charlene Bateman is a well-known local candle maker. This is Athena's Diaper Cakes & Hair Pretties - she crochets children's hats and baby accessories. This is Zephyr Transformative Art - Deborah hand paints these tranquility smidgets..."

George continues this way for an hour - there is a lot to see at The Coolest Little Ice Cream Shop. The store closes down in November and reopens as the Christmas Market. "During the COVID precautionary times, we had people lined up outside the shop," said George.

This amazing place and the great enthusiasm that he has for it, has earned George Karpouzis the title of Father Christmas. Visit him in December.

One of the first water playgrounds ever constructed was built at Ontario Place in 1971, by some of the innovative designers who came out fresh from the 1967 World's Fair in Montreal. The aquatic playground at Ontario Place had an undulating pool with a host of interactive and innovative water features, such as water bikes and handpumps. Over the years, the original water features started to have problems and features were removed one-by-one, and truth be told, the park had by that time seen better days. The first order that came in from the ad was to a company in Japan for water bikes. To fill the orders that were coming in, Wyeth worked in his basement and dedicated any spare time he had outside his job at Ontario Place, to designing, developing, and testing water toys. Eventually, Wyeth's water toy business took off, and in 2001 he left Ontario Place to work fulltime on Empex Watertoys.







COME FROM AWAY

Record-Setting Broadway Musical had a Stouffville Connection

When Rocky (Irwin) Sankoff phoned his daughter the morning of September 11, 2001 warning her not to go to classes that day at the acting studio in Manhattan where she was a student, he could never have imagined her collaborating on an epic stage musical that was an offshoot of the events of that infamous day, a show that would go on to be the longest running Canadian production ever to perform on Broadway.

Irene Sankoff and her musician husband David Hein remained in New York working and studying for several years after the 9/11 terrorist attack. They eventually returned to Toronto where Irene continued to work as an actress. She and David wrote their first musical stage play, My Mother's Lesbian Jewish Wiccan Wedding in 2009, with the production becoming a hit in Toronto and across Canada. As a result of the show's success, the couple was approached by noted theatre producer Michael Rubinoff to write the music and lyrics for a show based on Operation Yellow Ribbon, which saw the residents of Gander Newfoundland take in 7,000 passengers stranded there for five days when their flights were diverted due to the 9/11 terrorist attack in New York.

Irene and David went to Gander in 2011 for the 10-year reunion of the locals and the people who had been hosted there. amassing the collection of stories that would become the basis of their blockbuster stage production Come From Away. "You literally can't make this stuff up, no one would believe you, which is why there is so much verbatim in Come From Away," said Irene. "The fact it all happened is the most extraordinary thing of all."

The show was originally workshopped as a 45-minute production at Sheridan College's Canadian Music Theatre project in 2013. Irene and David then expanded it to the full-length musical that opened on Broadway in 2017, where it recently closed after a five-year run. It was performed at Toronto's Royal Alexander Theatre from 2018-21, has run in numerous noted theatres across North America and around the world, and will return to Toronto and Ottawa in 2024. Along the way, Irene and David have received a host of high-level live theatre awards and nominations in Canada and the United States, "It's been an amazing adventure, that's for sure," said Irene.

Looking back on the writing process, Irene recalls how parts of Come From Away were penned in her Dad's basement in Ballantrae, where the couple would retreat in between their endless travels across the continent developing the production. With a young baby in tow, they were more than glad to have Rocky and his wife Shirl, Irene's stepmother, entertain baby Molly for a while so they could work on the ongoing process of developing Come From Away. "It was a good place to escape and get some babysitting so we could focus


for a few hours," recalled Irene. "Dad fed us. and I think we took laundry down there a couple of times."

Rocky and Shirl, who now reside at the Bloom Stouffville Retirement Community, boast an endless array of printed materials and magazine covers featuring Come from Away and its creators. Their wardrobes include clothing emblazoned with artwork relating to the production. "You always want to promote what your kids are doing," said Rocky. "We're walking billboards for Come From Away. When we go on cruises we wear Come From Away T-shirts and ball caps. People come up to us and say 'I saw that show' and we tell them our daughter and son-in-law wrote it."

While Irene takes great pride in Come From Away's huge success, she suggests the people who provided the inspiration for the production deserve just as much credit as she and her husband. "It's truly unbelievable, the longest-running Canadian production and 49th longest-running show on Broadway, the longest-running show in the Gerald Schoenfeld Theatre {a Broadway theatre}. The show has broken records and won awards everywhere it's been. But that's just a testament to the Newfoundlanders and 'Come From Aways' who did something uniquely brave, which was to co-exist peacefully in less than ideal physical conditions under the threat of terrorism, and come away grateful for having spent that time together."

TWO-SPORT SAWYER TURNING **HEADS IN TRACK COMMUNITY**

Stouffville girl, 10, won her first-ever road race - defeating 1,400 women

Talk about rocking your debut.

Sawyer Nicholson, a 10-year-old from south Stouffville, won her first-ever road race at the Toronto Zoo this fall.

The first 'woman' to cross the finish line won the 5K in 19 minutes and 25 seconds. She finished ahead of 1,400 other female runners and most of the male competitors – she was 10th overall – at the Oasis ZooRun.

"I thought I had a bit of a chance at winning my age group," Sawyer told OTR. "But I never imagined winning the whole race, especially with that many women running."

Sawyer also captured Athletics Ontario junior gold medals in the 600m and 1.000m this summer and won a 1K in a provincial meet-record time of 3:18.09.

Not bad for a kid who only jumped into the sport a little over a year ago.

"She's definitely a talented athlete, that's for sure," says her coach of the

Sawyer has visions of an athletic scholarship and representing Canada at the Olympics.


But Coach Jones is realistic, noting Sawver does not win all of her races even against competitors her own age.

"The most important thing over the next five or six years is that we continue to develop her, ensuring that she's having fun first and foremost and seeing how good she can get during her high school years leading up to university," he said. "Keeping things fun, keeping things age-appropriate and seeing the results that unfold."

Sawyer has outdoor and indoor competitions on the family calendar in Niagara Falls and Toronto this fall. Plus there's the cross-country season where Sawyer will compete with her classmates from Wendat Village Public School.

What keeps Sawyer training and competing?

"I like being on the podium and getting fast times," she said. "And everyone in running is super friendly."

ROAD SAFETY & DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME

Daylight Saving Time comes to an end on Sunday November 6 at 2:00am. While getting that extra hour of sleep is most welcome, this one-hour time change may have some negative effects when it comes to road safety. When our sleep cycle is interrupted it can affect our health and make us more prone to accidents. Research has proven that there is a notable increase in traffic accidents when time shifts both in the spring and fall.

Drowsiness behind the wheel is one of the leading causes of traffic accidents. In fact, driving drowsy is just as dangerous as driving impaired. Drivers who miss only one to two hours of the recommended seven hours of sleep per night nearly double their risk of being involved in an accident. The risk of a crash depends on the number of hours sleep:

- Six to seven hours of sleep: 1.3 times the crash risk
- Five to six hours of sleep: 1.9 times the crash risk

- Four to five hours of sleep: 4.3 times the crash risk
- Less than four hours of sleep: 11.5 times the crash risk

Don't take the risk! Follow these tips to reduce accidents after the clocks change:

- Keep your regular sleep routine. Go to bed at the same time you normally would so you can benefit from that extra hour of sleep
- Don't over caffeinate. Hydrate with water and have a healthy breakfast
- Before setting off for the day, clean your headlights, and your brake and signal lights
- Give yourself plenty of time to get where you want to go
- · Approach intersections and crosswalks with caution, as twilight nears it will be harder to see pedestrians and cyclists who may also be drowsy
- · Watch your speed, drive defensively, and drive according to the weather conditions
