BACK ALLEY MOTO CAFÉ OPENS IN DOWNTOWN STOUFFVILLE by Susan Tucker



Back Alley Moto Café is the new java joint in town, located at 6393 Main St., just a smidge west of Park Dr. Owner and Stouffville resident, Paul Dutra, has been in the coffee business for many years, offering up his expertise and special proprietary blends of carefully selected beans from around the world.

Paul's love of motorcycles is the theme behind this newly renovated space, complete with a decommissioned 1962 Triumph in the window. Paul has a varied background from working in sales, to building custom motorcycles, to coffee aficionado and now café owner. Throughout his changing career, his love of a satisfying coffee has always remained, ever searching out where the best cups of java could be found.

His café has been open since September of this year and still has a few things to come, as ideas are always presenting themselves. You can stop in for a piping hot cup of coffee and/or any of the specialties that can be made from coffee beans - espresso, latte, Americano – he and his staff will whip you up something delicious. Enjoy a selection of fresh Portuguese pastries, as well as unique sandwiches, and a few surprises still to be finalized.

You may have seen his coffee trailer popping up at events around Ontario - mostly car and motorcycle events - where he would serve up his finest blends to the crowds. He has four blends at the moment, and you can pick up bags of beans anytime. Café Racer is a blend of beans from two countries and is his light roast. Then comes Chopper, a three-country blend, his medium roast. Over to the medium dark roast called Bobber, again from three countries but different from the Chopper countries. To round out the bunch is his E-bike dark roast decaf, a single origin roast.

A new dark roast is coming soon and will be called Scrambler, so watch for that if you're a dark roast fan. While you may see flavours noted on the bags, that is to indicate the type of taste you'll get from that blend, but there are no flavour additives, just straight up 100% pure coffee beans.

Back Alley Moto Café is open Monday through Friday, 7 AM - 7 PM, and Saturday and Sunday 7 AM - 3 PM. Tell Paul you read about him here! Go back regularly to see what's new and enjoy delicious coffee and treats, and don't forget to pick up beans to take home. For the month of December, be sure to try out their tasty holiday drink—the Candy Cane Dirty Chai Latte!

Honouring the Remarkable Life and Service of Aurelia Smith

Long-time Stouffville resident received Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal in 2003

Stouffville's Aurelia Smith was known for her unwavering dedication to her community and country. A proud Veteran of World War II, she served with distinction in the Women's Royal Canadian Navy Service (Wren) as a Lead Wren. Her journey began with basic training in Galt in 1942, after which she was posted to Halifax. Her commitment to duty and excellence shone brightly throughout her service, and she received her Honourable Discharge in 1945, marking the end of her wartime contribution but the beginning of a lifelong commitment to service.

After the war, Aurelia returned to Stouffville and quickly became a cornerstone of the community. On February 9th, 1953, she became a charter member of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Stouffville Legion, a role she would hold with pride for the rest of her life. Serving multiple terms as President, she led with compassion and strength, and as the Convenor of the annual Blood Donor Clinics for an incredible 30 years, she demonstrated her dedication to helping others. Her life membership in the Auxiliary until her passing in November 2021 is a testament to her long-standing commitment.

Aurelia's passion for community service extended well beyond her work with the Legion. She served as a Stouffville Public School Board member, where her contributions helped shape the future of education. Recognizing the importance of connecting and supporting the Town's older residents, she helped establish the Stouffville Silver Jubilee Club. Now known as the Stouffville 55+ Club, this is a space for seniors to engage, connect, and thrive. Her love for local history also led her to assist with the creation of the book *Stouffville History* 1877-1977, preserving our heritage for future generations.

As an Executive member of the Stouffville Business and Professional Women's Club, Aurelia championed the advancement of women in the workforce. She also served as a Deputy Returning Officer during municipal elections, ensuring the democratic process ran smoothly. In her role

with the Stouffville Cancer Society, where she was once the Co-Convenor of Special Events, Aurelia tirelessly worked to support those affected by cancer.

Aurelia was married to Walter Smith for 60 years. Walt became a volunteer firefighter in Stouffville in 1948 and served as Fire Chief from 1958 until his retirement in 1986.

In 2003, her exceptional contributions were recognized when she received the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal, an honour fitting for a woman who gave so much to both Stouffville and Canada.

Aurelia Smith's legacy is one of selfless service, dedication, and love, and she will always be remembered as a true pillar of the Stouffville community.

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A TASTE OF ITALY

at Stouffville Junction

A new restaurant is set to open at Stouffville Junction, located at Main St. and Edward St., blending authentic Italian flavours with the rich history of the Town's landmark building. Founded by experienced restaurateurs Marco Sargian and Roberto Staiano, this venture is more than just a dining experience—it's a culinary celebration of both northern and southern Italy.

Marco Sargian, a head chef with many years of experience, hails from Casale Monferrato in northern Italy. Known for his masterful balance of flavour, Marco has worked in acclaimed restaurants across Europe and Canada, including the Michelin-starred Don Alfonso. His counterpart, Roberto, a general manager and certified sommelier with over two decades of expertise, brings his southern Italian roots from Capri to the table. and his contributions to Buca in Toronto have only cemented his reputation.

Together, they aim to recreate an authentic Italian dining experience, reflecting the diversity of Italian cuisine. One of the key figures behind the project, explains, "We wanted to find a community that would appreciate the authenticity we bring. Stouffville is a thriving and growing community, and its diverse culture makes it the perfect fit for a restaurant like this."

Why Stouffville Junction?

The team behind the restaurant was drawn to the historic Stouffville Junction, a building with deep roots in the town's development. Originally constructed in the 1860s at the northeast corner of Main St. and Edward St., this site once served the bustling Toronto & Nipissing rail line, allowing local goods to flow to Toronto.

Authentic regional flavours will be represented, along with a few innovative, fusion-inspired dishes that blend traditional tastes with a modern twist.

A Restaurant That's More Than Just Food

The restaurant itself has been designed to offer three distinct dining experiences. At the heart of the establishment is a beautiful bar area, perfect for grabbing a drink with friends. Adjacent to this is the main dining room, which features natural light, wooden accents, and a warm, welcoming ambiance. 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THE HUNT FOR THE

DISCOVERING STOUFFVILLE'S CHRISTMAS TREE FARMS

Bringing home the most magnificent tree they can find at their local Christmas tree farm is a tradition and a delight which many families in Stouffville look forward to every year.

Some people are new to the whole tree farm experience like the small boy who accompanied his parents to the Gerencer Family Tree Farm last year. He couldn't wait to help his dad cut down that tree. The little one scrambled out of the car, firmly holding his little toy saw.

A local couple brought their baby boy to Tufford's Tree Farm to begin an annual tradition, and now that baby is

Along with Gerencer and Tufford's, two of the longest running operations —Horton Tree Farms and the Vivian Plantation—and the MacPherson Christmas Tree Farm, are gearing up for this year's Christmas tree season in Stouffville, offering a wide variety of short and long needle trees.

However, you will no longer be able to go to the Middleton Tree Farm. In business since 1985, its owners have decided to

As well as providing memorable Christmas experiences, many of these farmers also helped to reforest our municipality.

At Horton Tree Farms, the Horton brothers, Hal, Bert, and Brian, run the farm their parents, Keith and Joy Horton, bought in 1961. They started out by pruning

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the trees already growing there, "so they would be looking more like a Christmas tree than a Charlie Brown tree," said Hal Horton with a chuckle. Then they started planting for the cut-your-own operation. At one time the Hortons had several farms including an apple orchard and an outdoor educational centre, and the maple sugar bush which continues to this day. Back then, with visitors to the sugar bush, the Christmas tree farm and the apple orchard, "We had 600 buses between the three seasons." Hal Horton noted.

With heritage buildings such as a log barn and maple cabin and something called a monkey tree, Horton Tree Farms has been the location for several commercials and movie shoots and there are lots of settings for memorable photos when visitors get their tree. The farm offers hot chocolate, a bonfire, and tree baling. Your canine companion, on a leash, will be welcomed too.

They also owned Magic Hill farm on Ninth Line from 1979, which closed just a few years ago.

"We planted trees there and turned it into a tree farm from a gravel pit," Hal Horton said proudly. "In 1979 there wasn't a tree on that property."

Why Christmas Trees?

Cut-your-own Christmas tree farms developed after farmers began buying land in the northern part of Whitchurch-Stouffville and planting trees to augment



the ones already growing there. Why Christmas trees? "Nothing else would grow here," stated Lynn Stuart, who runs the Vivian Plantation, a three-generation business, which her family purchased in 1947. Her dad, William Grose, known by all as Earl, planted their property in red pines in the 1950s, before putting in Christmas trees in the '50s and '60s. He also helped neighbouring farmers, Clifford and Kenneth Hollidge, in their planting efforts. In 1924, the latters' property had become the Hollidge Tract—the first tract of land reforested under the Ontario Agreement Forest program, whereby

local governments could purchase these sand-swept properties to be planted and managed by the provincial government. Other tracts came on board and together they developed into the York Region Forest we know today where people come to enjoy the peaceful nature around them in the forest which is spread over 2,500 hectares (just over 6,000 acres). It also features accessible paths and a variety of programs.

These lush forests and the Christmas tree farms are a far cry from the sandy wastelands that resulted

after a century of clear cutting. Logs were taken out via the railway station at Vivian, Ms. Stuart noted.

With no tree roots, the sandy soil began to blow away. Sometimes the sand dunes

became so high they had to be cleared from roadways by plows.

But now as you drive along roads such as McCowan Ave. or Hwy 48 past these majestic forests, you'll notice the treesareinevenlyspaced rows. Many of them are the red pines and white pines still standing from when they were planted between the 1920s and 1960s, to help anchor

down the soil. There are even some of the original trees planted in 1924.

So, what does it take to raise that tree from seedling to the arboreal splendour you hoist onto your car? I got a small inkling when I talked to Lynn Stuart of the Vivian Plantation: she was out standing in her field, holding a chain saw in one hand and a pruning shear in the other. As well as pruning and weeding and hoping the seedlings don't dry up when it doesn't rain, farmers cope with the insects that want to munch on your trees. And it's certainly not a one-season harvest. According to the Christmas Tree Farmers of Ontario website "...a tree is harvested only after ten years" and "90% of the farm must remain in trees all the time."

The Vivian Plantation offers visitors hot apple cider and a bonfire. Garlands and boughs are also available. When you cut your tree or buy one pre-cut, you can bring a picnic to enjoy at the tables scattered throughout the picturesque plantation and take a photo at their self-portrait location. Dogs on a leash are welcome.

A Walk Through the Woods

Tufford's Tree Farm is a small family tree farm which has been in operation since 1965. In the beginning, the owner, Blake Tufford, sold the existing trees and when it came time to plant more he was guided along by "a local tree farmer at our church," he recalled.

About 20 years ago, the farm was home to a "very well-behaved white Percheron horse to pull the trees out of the woods for people," he said. Now it is people

power. Because it is a smaller property, people cutting their trees will "have a pleasant, short walk through the woods," noted Mr. Tufford, who now partners with his children, David and Elaine, to run the farm. He was pleased that all of the 400 trees they

planted this year grew "because of the nice rainy season" earlier in the year and pronounced it an excellent year for the trees.

There's a safe toboggan hill for the kids and an open fire to gather around.

Wagon Rides and Hot Chocolate

MacPherson Christmas Tree Farm has been selling Christmas trees since the 1980s with the cut-your-own operation added in 1988 on their 40-acre property.

They, like many other tree farmers in the area, noticed the effects of COVID in a unique way. There was actually a shortage of Christmas trees during those years. That's because so many people wanted to get out of the city and do something socially distanced, explained owner Don MacPherson.

"We had at least a 35% increase in tree sales during those years and that resulted in a shortage for a time," he added.

With some relief he said, "This is the first year we will have enough trees."

He runs the farm with his daughter and her husband, and other family members.

The farm offers wagon rides, hot chocolate, and scavenger hunts for the kids. They'll bale your tree and have hot dogs and sausages for sale to enjoy around the bonfire. A special bake sale will be on during the season with 100% of profits being donated to the Hospital for Sick Children.

Bring Your Own Sled

The Gerencer Tree Farm run by Steve and Maria Gerencer has been in business for around 30 years and they started

selling cut-your-own Christmas trees about ten years ago.

"We have sleds for the kids to be pulled on—or the cut trees," she said. "A lot of people bring their own sleds."

Maria Gerencer delights in seeing people come to the farm each year who really get into the festive spirit. She particularly remembers a couple who brought along their little baby and two small dogs. All three were dressed in similar festive outfits.

Last year she noticed two couples with a tarp. After they had chosen their trees, they laid them on the tarp, each person grasped one corner, and they slid those trees right along to their car.

Many older people show up for their tree right when the farm opens for the season, she has observed. They want to enjoy their Christmas tree for some time before they fly south for the winter.

The Gerencer Tree Farm offers hot chocolate and candy canes, and Ms. Gerencer will also be baking cookies for visitors coming to cut their tree.

Cheerful seasonal planters and other greenery are for sale as well.


GOTTA BE-LEAF: STOUFFVILLE'S CONNECTION TO TORONTO'S NHL TEAM GOES WAY BACK

From George Armstrong and Bob Hassard, to Keith Acton and Brandon Pridham

There might not be enough of a connection to mount 'Home of the Toronto Maple Leafs' signs at the entrances to town.

But Stouffville's link to those lovable NHL Leafs goes way back.

The late George Armstrong called the then village home during the 1950s. Long before Hwy 404 even thought about extending this far north, Armstrong rented the home of Stouffville's Helen and Bob Hassard and family, and commuted to Maple Leaf Gardens while good buddy Bob was playing in the American Hockey League. Neighbours

and Main St. merchants alike fondly recall interactions with Armstrong.

Hassard was on the 1951 Toronto squad that won the Stanley Cup.

Armstrong, the Leafs captain for 13 seasons, won four cups.

Bill Root, Ken Wregget, Mark Laforest, and Chris Kotsopoulos lived in Stouffville while playing for the Leafs during the late 1980s. Their homes were along the Millard Street-Hemlock Dr. corridor, back when that stretch of pavement was the northern border of the community.

Wendel Clark lived in an estate subdivision west of Ballantrae during his second stint in blue and white.

Stouffville's own Brad May played for the Leafs in 2008-09, near the end of his 18-year NHL career. A Stanley Cup champ with Anaheim in 2007, Brad and daughter Samantha competed on CTV's Amazing Race Canada this year.

Another hometown boy of 1,000-plus NHL games, Keith Acton, was an assistant coach with the Leafs for nine seasons. Acton, who also played in the NHL for 15 seasons, is now a Stouffville town councillor and restaurateur.

Six degrees of Stouffville? Bob Hassard coached Keith Acton during the 1960s when the Stouffville Arena was located on Park Dr., on what's now parkland across from Latcham Hall.

Bob's son, Bill, was selected by the Leafs in the 1974 NHL Draft.

Today, Brandon Pridham, a former Stouffville Clipper who still lives locally, is an assistant general manager with the Leafs.

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






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




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Forever St. Nick

Here comes Santa Claus!

Yes, kids, St. Nick will soon be on his way, led by a red-nosed Rudolph and his eight spirited reindeer – Dasher, Dancer, Prancer and Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner and Blitzen.

Catch all the Christmas magic in shopping malls, parades, schools, and churches while you wait for him to take flight aboard his sleigh from his residence with the energetic elves in the North Pole.

Christmas Eve is a long trip, making so many house calls, and there are a few things you can do to welcome him. First, place a plate of cookies on a table near your tree, along with a glass of milk. During so long a journey, Santa's likely to be hungry and thirsty. Should you have a fireplace, leave the milk and cookies nearby, where they're sure to be seen.

Next, do as Mom and Dad say and go to bed early.

Believe me, sleeping won't be easy. With so many hoped-for gifts going through your mind, just say a little prayer and close your eyes. Morning will come sooner than you think.

Then what?

At sunrise, go to the bedroom window or peak out the front door and look for sleigh tracks. If there's no snow on the ground, check out the grass for hoof prints. For sure, if the milk and cookies are gone, you know your house hasn't been missed.

For me, living on a farm, I was always sure to see sleigh tracks or hoof prints, It was then I knew Santa had come and gone. What a joy!

As said, Christmas on a farm was, and, for some, still is, far different from Christmas in town. Where I now live, in Stouffville, it's common for some families to open gifts on Christmas Eve. But not in the country where Dad will likely have cows to milk, chickens to feed and eggs to gather. Mom too will be busy cooking goose or turkey for dinner. But first came breakfast—oatmeal porridge, toast and jam. Then, and only then, was it giftgiving time. What a pleasure, despite the fact hand-outs were limited to one contribution per child. This was sufficient.

One year I received a toy fire truck and another year a second-hand pair of skates. Each was what I wanted, so Santa obviously read my note.

We never had to look far for a Christmas tree. Dad simply would cut the top from one of many trees lining our driveway. We were the first of all neighbours to enjoy Christmas tree lights. Trouble was, if one light went out, they all went out. This was discouraging.

Initially, the celebration date was established as December 6th but later changed to December 25th where, in the words of one historian "we were given the greatest gift of all."

Santa Claus has a rich history, starting with St. Nicholas, a generous 4th-century bishop. His legend spread through Dutch tradition as "Sinterklaas," evolving into the Santa we know today. Santa, with his red suit, sleigh, and flying reindeer, brings joy to children worldwide on Christmas Eve, delivering presents to those on his "nice list." His story was cemented by the famous 1823 poem A Visit from St. Nicholas and continues to inspire holiday magic today.



- Salt and pepper to taste

Instructions:

1. Prepare the Peppers

2. Prepare the Filling

In a large skillet, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the chopped onion and garlic, and sauté for about 3-4 minutes, until fragrant and softened.

Next, remove the sausage meat from the casing and mix in with the ground beef. Add the meat to the skillet breaking it up with a spoon as it cooks. Cook for 6-8 minutes until browned. Season the meat with oregano, salt, and pepper.

Once the meat is cooked, stir in the diced tomatoes and smoked paprika and let the mixture simmer for about 5-10 minutes to combine the flavours.

Remove the skillet from heat and stir in the cooked rice, shredded cheese, chopped parsley and basil. Adjust seasoning to taste.

4. Stuff the Peppers

Place the peppers in a baking dish, ensuring they are standing upright. If you've halved the peppers, lay them cut side up.

Spoon the filling generously into each pepper, packing it in until the peppers are full. If you like, sprinkle a little extra cheese on top of each pepper for a golden, melted crust. This time I layered the cheese and filling a few times.

5. Bake the Peppers

Preheat your oven to 375°F (190°C). Pour about half a cup of water or tomato sauce into the bottom of the baking dish to steam the peppers as they cook.

Cover the dish with foil and bake for 25-30 minutes. After 20 minutes, remove the foil to let the tops brown slightly.

6. Garnish and Serve

Once the peppers are done baking, remove them from the oven and let them cool slightly. Garnish with additional fresh herbs or a drizzle of sour cream and serve alongside a crisp garden salad or crusty bread.

Great Variations

Mexican-Inspired: Use black beans, corn, and cilantro in the filling, and add some spice with chili powder or diced jalapeños.

Chili Inspired: Make your favourite batch of chili and use that as the stuffing.

Tips for Storing and Reheating

If you have leftovers, stuffed peppers store beautifully. Allow them to cool completely before transferring to an airtight container. They'll keep in the fridge for 3-4 days or in the freezer for up to 3 months. To reheat, bake them in the oven at 350°F (175°C) for 15-20 minutes until warm.

Final Thoughts

Stuffed peppers are an excellent way to use up a garden bounty while enjoying a nutritious, comforting meal. Whether you're stuffing them with traditional ground meat and rice, or experimenting with new flavours, the freshness of homegrown peppers adds a special touch to every bite. Enjoy!



Council Approves New Downtown Stouffville Committee

Fireworks Banned; New Community Safety Zones Coming; Speed Cameras to be Installed

Downtown Committee

At the September 25th meeting, Council received a report detailing the history of Business Improvement Areas (BIAs) in Stouffville, providing background information for a potential vote on the re-establishment of a BIA in Downtown Stouffville at the October 2nd meeting.

At the meeting, however, Council approved the formation of a Village of Stouffville Advisory Committee (VSAC) andthenonOctober16th,Councilapproved its terms of reference. The Committee will "work to identify opportunities and barriers that contribute or detract from the Village of Stouffville as a vibrant place to live, work and play, while promoting it as a shopping, dining, cultural, and tourism destination through various avenues. The Committee shall act as a strategic advisor to facilitate visioning, planning, and coordination on projects and/or events within the area."

It will consist of seven members, two of which will be Councillors from Ward 5 and 6. The additional five members of the Committee will be public members, with preference given to the Village of Stouffville business and property owners.

Personal Fireworks

At the October 16th meeting, Council banned the sale and use of personal and family fireworks throughout Stouffville. Staff will draw up the By-law and have Council approve it early next year.

Community Safety Zones

On September 25th, Stouffville Council approved the creation of 11 new Community Safety Zones.

Community Safety Zones (CSZs) have been part of Ontario's traffic legislation since 1998 and currently exist in five locations in Stouffville, all on regional roads near schools. This Council decision expands CSZ coverage to 11 additional public and Catholic school areas, including Summitview Public School, Glad Park Public School, and Stouffville District Secondary School.

The zones are intended to enhance public safety, especially for vulnerable road users like children. Fines are doubled for all traffic offences in the designated zones.

Streets identified for expansion include Main St., Millard St., Hoover Park Dr., and others where speeding is a concern. The goal is to establish CSZs as an enforcement and educational tool without physical modifications to the

According to the report, the estimated cost for implementing each CSZ is around \$3,500, which includes signage and pavement markings. Each zone requires approximately 16 signs, and funding will come from the Engineering and Public Works operating account.

Speed Camera Locations

Earlier this year, Council approved a new automated speed enforcement program that will see speed cameras installed throughout Stouffville. At the October 16th meeting, Council authorized staff to pick the number of cameras and their locations based on a "data-driven approach."

Cameras can only be placed in Community Safety Zones, of which Stouffville has 17 (see previous story). Once the number of cameras is determined, deployment is expected to take a minimum of eight to ten weeks, dependent on locates, hydro hookups, and weather. Legislation requires that signage be posted at least 90 days in advance of the cameras going live, informing the public that a camera installation is "coming soon."

The primary goal of implementing cameras is to reduce traffic accidents and fatalities caused by speeding. The program has been shown to lower speeds, improve traffic flow, and reduce both the frequency and severity of collisions. The system captures and records images of vehicles exceeding the posted speed limit. When a vehicle passes, the system takes a photograph that documents the date and time, location and direction of travel, vehicle speed, posted speed limit, and a unique identifier for the speeding vehicle. This data is used to issue penalties and help regulate traffic.

Parking Meeting

To address residential parking concerns throughout Stouffville, Town staff will be holding a statutory public meeting to address potential changes to the Town's parking by-law. The date of meeting, at which the public are invited to voice concerns and opinions, has not been set. Check the Town's website at townofws.ca frequently for more information.
